Local family hopes to spark dialogue about suicide issue

FORT PIERRE — Suicide is the second-leading cause of death in South Dakota for people between the ages of 10 and 34, regardless of sex or race, according to statistics from the Suicide Prevention Resource Center.

No one knows or understands the loss from suicide better than Leta Wise Spirit, whose son, Fabian, committed suicide in Pierre three years

In an effort to bring awareness and spark dialogue about suicide, Wise Spirit spear-

headed the Suicide Awareness Memorial Walk

"We wanted to bring awareness to the community because a lot of people have committed suicide in our community, but nobody talks about it," Wise Spirit said. "We wanted to let the community know that it is OK to talk about it, and that a family can heal. And I wanted to do it in memory of my son. He was a person who helped a lot of people in his life."

The walk was held near the United Sioux Tribes powwow arena Saturday, just before registration for the Lewis &

Dems proposal runs into GOP resistance

WASHINGTON Democratic legislation to regulate troop combat tours in Iraq ran into stiff resistance in the Senate Wednesday from Republicans who said the mil-

as they do deployed. Currently, Army soldiers spend about 15 months in combat and 12 months home.

One of several Democratic proposals intended to challenge President Bush on the Iraq war, Webb's bill was seen as having the best shot at achieving the 60 votes needed to advance. The bill attracted three dozen co-sponsors, including Republicans Chuck Hagel of Nebraska, Olympia Snowe of Maine and Gordon Smith of Oregon.

"You cannot continue to load on to 1 percent of our society all the burdens, all the sacrifices as we are doing. It's wrong," Hagel told reporters at a Capitol Hill news confer-

But other Republicans said the bill would micromanage the military and potentially force a withdrawal of troops

Sen. John McCain, the top Republican on the Armed Services Committee and a Vietnam veteran, called the Webb bill a "backdoor method" of forcing troop withdrawals, which could spark chaos and genocide in the region.

PIERRE — On Valentine's Day, 1943, German forces captured about 1,800 men in the 34th Division in North Africa - many of those men were from South Dakota.

"They were marched through the desert to Tunis,' said Michael Luick-Thrams, executive director of the TRACES Center for History and Culture. "They were flown to Naples and then sent on box cars to Germany and they spent 2 years in German camps

Luick-Thrams currently traveling with the bus exhibit 'Behind Barbed Wire: Midwest POWs in Nazi Germany, and it made a stop in Pierre Wednesday afternoon. The bus had drawings, clothing and pictures of men who were prison-

nizations. "It shows that we care highly about the immunization rate of our children — generally that we care about the well-being and the health of the children


