Teen killed in weekend wreck identified

The Coroner's Office released the identity Saturday of the Clark County teenager who died Friday night when the car he was riding in crashed into some trees and a fence on Colby Road.

Crowe, 19, who had graduated from George Rogers Clark High School last summer, said County Coroner Robert Gayheart.

The investigation showed he died of multiple injuries due to blunt force trauma and that he had been ejected from the vehicle.

The accident happened near

Crossbrook Lane and the First Church of God just inside the Winchester city limits.

At press time this morning, the Winchester Police Department, which is handling the investigation, had not yet released the report including the names of the driver and other passenger because the

officer who is working on the report, Greg Vaught, is in training all this week in Richmond.

Gayheart said, however, that both the driver and other passenger were treated at Clark Regional Medical Center for injuries that were not life-threatening. Sheriff Berl Perdue, who was on the scene

that night, said the driver was not seriously injured.

Perdue said it appeared that excessive speed was a factor in the crash, and that alcohol use was suspected.

Police received the call about the accident at 9:37 p.m.

Job hunt: Students to ponder futures at career fair

Local students will have an opportunity to learn about job and education possibilities next month during the College and Career Fair at George Rogers Clark High School. And organizers are hoping that additional businesses will sign up by Tuesday.

The event, scheduled from 9 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. on April 1, is being sponsored by the Winchester-Clark County Chamber of Commerce, the Clark County Community Education Program and the GRC Youth Services Center. It is expected to feature dozens of businesses and at least nine area colleges.

"It's been several years since we have done a career fair, and this year we were asked to include colleges as well," said Cora Heffner from Community Education. "We thought it would be a great opportunity for students to be able to see some of our area colleges as well as local businesses."

Heffner said the businesses will range from manufacturing and skilled trades to non-profits and health professions.
