dispute CHP findings

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Yuba County Supervisor Andy Vasquez said in a statement issued Saturday that he wouldn't have done anything differently the night he was injured by a motorcycle after he tried to get the driver to slow down on his street.

Vasquez, who suffered a broken collarbone and other injuries in the April 2 accident, said in the statement he felt justified in his actions because the driver, Edward Staving of Linda, was driving in an unsafe way.

A copy of the CHP report Vasquez supplied to the Appeal-Democrat describes Staving as having an expired driver's license at the time of

PROBATION VIOLATION

Photo worth a dozen years

Facebook picture
showed woman
holding gun

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A 163-day jail sentence turned into 12 years in prison for a woman who was found in violation of probation after she posted a Facebook photo of herself holding a handgun.

Yuba County Judge Kathleen O'Connor on Monday gave Amy Marie Butler, 24, the maximum sentence for her part in a 2005 abortive marijuana robbery that led to the shooting deaths of Olivehurst residents Scott Davis and Christopher Hance.

Butler's probation was set to end in 2014. But last year she went on a camping trip to

Relief turns to grief: Families 'dismayed' by terrorist's burial

NEW YORK - Rosaleen Tallon kissed her three children good night and went to sleep feeling at peace. The terrorist responsible for the death of her brother, New York firefighter Sean Patrick Tallon, was dead. Her two boys and her little girl had been assured that the "bad man" behind the attacks that claimed their uncle was gone.

THE BURIAL

The White House issued the following statement on Osama bin Laden's body:

"The burial of bin Laden's remains was done in strict conformance with Islamic precepts and practices. It was prepared in accordance with the Islamic requirements. We early on made provisions for that type of burial, and we wanted to make sure that it was going to be done, again, in strictest conformance."

Tallon said as her 20-month-old son, Paddy, nestled in her arms while savoring a red lollipop. "I think that was too hasty. I would've liked the American people to say without a shadow of a doubt: 'Yes, that's him.'"

Rosemary Cain not only would like to see the body, she'd have happily been the one to fire the shot that killed the man responsible for her son George's death. And Maureen Santo-

But when Tallon awoke Monday to the news that Osama bin Laden had been buried at sea, she was stunned. That was one corpse she would like to have seen for herself, said Tallon, her fiery words underscoring the change this suburban science teacher has undergone in the past decade.

"I wouldn't be honest if I didn't say I was a little dismayed - a lot dismayed."

"We've gotten quite a few honks," her passenger said as they waited at a Marysville stoplight on Monday evening.

Residents rejoice over Osama bin Laden news

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"Bout damn time." Mary Carter's reaction to the news of al-Qaeda head Osama bin Laden's death Sunday could've served as a response for many in the Yuba-Sutter area, who welcomed the terrorist leader's demise while lamenting it didn't come until nearly a decade after the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks.

Bin Laden's demise at the hands of a Navy SEAL team spurred a bit of patriotism, with one resident painting a message on the back of her SUV: "Bin Laden is dead! Yeah!"

Larry Stange, of Yuba City, had a more conventional response, putting up a flag outside his Yuba City house after mulling the idea overnight Sunday.

"I feel like we need to show some kind of support for the United States," said Stange, 77, a U.S. Marine Corps veteran. "I'm a Republican, but I'm applauding the Democrats and President Obama for doing this, if nothing else."

Stange said he hoped bin Laden's death would spur unity among U.S. citizens again, along with sending a message to enemies of unwavering resolve.
