Lathrop implements voluntary common dress for upcoming 2011-12 school

LATHROP - A "voluntary common dress" is being implemented at Lathrop Elementary

when the new school year starts in August. Eighty-three parents have committed to send their children to school in three basic colors - yellow, white, and black - and stick to polo shorts, blue jeans or khakis including

shorts, skirts, and blouses. Lathrop Parent Teacher Club President April Victorine, one of the parents spearheading the effort, noted the move is to try and eliminate kids from pressuring parents to "one-up" or match clothing of other students, and to guard against students inadvertently or on purpose - dressing in gang colors.

Million dollar elderly abuse case in court

Renee and Jerry Woolf of rural Manteca face three felony counts of financial elder abuse, credit card fraud and one white collar crime enhancement involving \$1.4 million of their 80-year-old aunt's savings as they enter the final days of a month-long Superior Court

trial in Stockton. Assistant District Attorney Cherie Adams said the couple took care of the aunt after she was stricken by a stroke. Now it must be determined by the court how much of her savings were actually used for her care and how much went to the benefit of Woolf's immediate family and business.

"There's been over a million that has been in and out of the account," Adams said.

Bank records reportedly indicated that as of January 2010 there was less than \$5,000 left in her account. Adams added that the spend-
