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Pulled from drain pipe, Gadhafi was shown no mercy


SIRTE, Libya — Dragged from hiding in a drainage pipe, a wounded Moammar Gadhafi raised his hands and begged revolutionary fighters: "Don't kill me, my sons." Within an hour, he was dead, but not before jubilant Libyans had vented decades of hatred by pulling the eccentric dictator's hair and

parading his bloodied body on the hood of a truck.

The death Thursday of Gadhafi, two months after he was driven from power and into hiding, decisively buries the nearly 42-year regime that had turned the oil-rich country into an international pariah and his own personal fiefdom.

It also thrusts Libya into a new age in which its transitional leaders must overcome deep divisions and

Area man charged with impersonating sheriff's deputy

A local man who pulled over motorists and issued bogus tickets was arrested early Wednesday for allegedly masquerading as a Garland County Sheriff's Department deputy.

Wilmar Arnulfo Perez, 20, of 156 Piney Loop, was taken into custody at his residence shortly before 10 a.m. and charged with a felony count of criminal impersonation of a law enforcement officer, punishable by up to six years in prison, and misdemeanor counts of theft by receiving less than \$1,000 and possession of a blue light.


Agents with U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement also put a hold on Perez, who is apparently in the country illegally, sheriff's investigator Bill House said Thursday.

Perez was still being held Thursday on \$10,000 bond and is set to appear Nov. 1 in Hot Springs District Court. If convicted, he could face up to one year in jail on the misdemeanor counts.

House said about three days ago they began hearing about a suspect in a dark green Ford Taurus with red and blue LED lights pulling over motorists in the western part of the county.

The suspect was wearing a black T-shirt with "SHERIFF" written in white letters, which House noted can be purchased at "any Army/Navy store," and was carrying what turned out to be a black BB gun in his waistband. The gun

Entergy to lower 2 local lakes to aid areas facing drought

Entergy Arkansas Inc. will start to slowly lower lakes Hamilton and Catherine beginning Monday, in advance of the winter drawdown, to benefit drought-stricken areas downstream on the Ouachita River.

Entergy said it will lower lakes Hamilton and Catherine about half an inch, to one inch, per day to help mitigate low-water flows on the Ouachita River in south Arkansas.

"The effect on public recreational use of the lakes will be minor," Bobby Pharr, process superintendent of Entergy Arkansas Hydro Operations, said Thursday.

The result of the releases will be to lower the lakes to the bottom of their normal summertime operating rule curves. The operating rule curve is a band of low and high levels within which lake levels are maintained.

The U.S. Corps of Engineers said in a news release last week that it received requests from the governors of Arkansas and Louisiana on Oct. 7 requesting assistance with decreased water flows on the Ouachita River.

The Corps of Engineers on Oct. 7 and 11 hosted a conference call with more than 20 entities that included congressional representatives, state and local government agencies, and numerous stakeholders to discuss the decreased flows.

The Corps of Engineers had to curtail the flow of water through its lock and dam on the Ouachita near Crossett after the reserve water level in the Felsenthal Wildlife Management Area dropped below a certain level.

The Corps of Engineers uses water from the wildlife refuge to supplement the releases Entergy makes into the Ouachita River to send through the lock and dam.

The reduced flow wasn't high enough to meet dilution requirements from environmental regulators for the industries and cities, including West Monroe, La., that rely on releasing millions of gallons of treated wastewater into the river each day, according to The Associated Press.

The Corps of Engineers said Wednesday that it would increase the flow by lowering the 150,000-acre pool at Felsenthal by about a foot.

MC EAST students assist Joplin, Mo., by making video

MALVERN — A group of Magnet Cove High School Environmental And Spatial Technologies students have started creating a music video to provide additional assistance to people in Joplin, Mo., who were impacted by a tornado in May.

"One of the kids had mentioned they wanted to reach out beyond the community, and I said, 'How do you propose to do that?'" said EAST facilitator Michael Nicolosi on Wednesday.

"They started brainstorming and started talking about natural disasters and Joplin came up. We started doing a little bit of research, and they wanted to do something for them."

Nicolosi said to make the video, the students received footage, about 9,000 photographs from Joplin, and a music video created by country band LiveWire for their song "Miracle of the Human Spirit" in September from Nicolosi's brother.

"I was online with my brother, who owns Torn Curtain Productions in Nashville. His name is Mark Nicolosi," he said. "He said he just got tapped to do a music video for a band called LiveWire, who had written a song to raise awareness for the Joplin relief."

"I asked him, 'What can students do in this?' He got a hold of the band's manager and the label, and they came up with this

Son of man arrested on drug warrant detained on similar charges

The son of a local man arrested last week when Hot Springs police executed a narcotics search warrant on their home was arrested early Wednesday on similar charges.

Spencer Garrett Lee, 18, of 111 Highland St., was taken into custody at his residence around 9:30 a.m. and charged with felony counts of simultaneous possession of drugs and firearms, possession of a controlled substance with intent to deliver and manufacturing a

controlled substance, both involving marijuana, possession of drug paraphernalia and contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

Lee, who was initially held without bond, was later released and is set to appear Nov. 1 in Hot Springs District

Court. If convicted on all charges, he could face up to life in prison.

His father, Michael Anthony Lee, 42, was taken into custody shortly before 5 p.m. Friday when HSPD street crimes detectives executed a search warrant on the Highland Street residence and lo-

cated the elder Lee, another adult male, identified as Bradley Earl Maynard, 48, of Glenwood, and a male juvenile in the living room and kitchen.

Detectives noted they could see and smell a large smoke cloud of marijuana
