Five schools among best in NC

District fares well in state's annual ABC grading report

Henderson County school officials said they're pleased with the district's 2011-12 ABC test results released Thursday, as five schools were named among the best in the state and 11 made high academic growth.

The ABCs of Public Education is the state's school accountability model. Annual ABC reports show the percentage of students at each school who test at proficiency level in certain subjects and grade levels, and the amount of growth schools make each year.

Testing is done in grades three through eight in reading and math, and in science for grades five through eight. At the high school level, students take end-of-course tests in seven subjects: algebra I, algebra II, biology, English I, U.S. history, civics and economics, and physical science, along with a writing assessment in 10th grade.

2012 marks the last year the state will use the ABC model. The state is transitioning to the READY school accountability model for 2012-13. This new model will incorporate new measures to gauge student success, although HCPS officials said the exact criteria is still being hammered out between the state Department of Public Instruction and the General Assembly. With the ABCs, schools earn a "status" based on

their proficiency rates, and Honor School of Excellence is the highest status. Schools must have at least 90 percent of students proficient in the tested subjects and also meet all federal Annual Measurable Objectives requirements.

AMOs have replaced the Adequate Yearly Progress measure previously required by the U.S. Department of Education. Under AMOs, proficiency targets are set for each student subgroup.

Chick-fil-A has its biggest day ever

Hendersonville Chick-fil-A owner Joel Benson said he saw

record numbers Wednesday at his franchise during a national Appreciation Day in support of the restaurant chain. "It's the biggest day we ever

had," he said, calling the turnout "a phenonomen." "It's a recordbreaking day nationwide.' Across the country, Chick-fil-A

saw more than \$4 million in sales, according to Benson. He did not have exact numbers for his res-

taurant.

Former Arkansas Governor Mike Huckabee called for the rally of support after Chick-fil-A CEO Dan T. Cathy stated he supported the "biblical definition" of marriage.

Benson said the surprising thing for him was that many people showed support not only for the issue of defining marriage, but out

of principle.

It was about freedom of speech more than anything," he said. The restaurant ran out of food

by 7:15 p.m. Wednesday. They

started running out of ice cream and lemonade first, then some types of chicken sandwiches. 'Many of the guests (said) it

didn't matter," Benson said.

Benson has owned the franchise for the past 11 years and said he loves being a part of the community.
