GIRL, 3, KILLED IN RANDOLPH ROUTE 24 TWO-VEHICLE ACCIDENT

A 3-year-old girl died after sustaining serious injuries in a car accident on Route 24 in Randolph Wednesday night.

The two-vehicle crash occurred at 5:54 p.m. in the northbound lanes before the highway merged with Interstate 93.

The girl, who had been a passenger in a 2000 Toyota Corolla, was transported by ambulance to Boston Medical Center, where she later died from her injuries, said state police. A man driving the car and female passenger were not injured in the crash. The female driver of the other car was taken to Milton Hospital with injuries that were not life-threatening.

BOSTON FBI AGENT JOHN CONNOLLY MAY BE FREED FROM PRISON


Convicted and jailed in the 1982 mob hit of a Miami Jai-Alai executive tied to Boston mobster James "Whitey" Bulger, disgraced former FBI agent John Connolly has a shot at freedom after a Florida appeals court threw out his conviction because of a technical error committed by Miami-Dade prosecutors who won his second-degree murder conviction in 2008.

The appeals panel concluded Connolly should not have been charged with that offense because the statute of limitations had run out.

Husband tried to flee U.S. day after Brockton slaying

Slain city woman's estranged husband held in Vermont jail on fugitive from justice charges


BROCKTON — A day after his estranged wife was killed, Jean-Michel Beaulieu was stopped trying to flee into Canada and held in connection with a homicide in Brockton, a border patrol spokesman told The Enterprise.

Florence Beaulieu, 37, was found dead in her Brockton home on Forest Avenue on May 16. She

was the mother of four.

The following day, Jean-Michel Beaulieu, 42, was stopped while trying to cross the border into Canada in Highgate, Vt., driving a gray BMW.

"He was coming through the port of entry and was stopped," said Stephen Sapp, a spokesman for U.S. Customs and Border Patrol. "We discovered that he was wanted for homicide in the city of

Sapp said the agency was already working with Massachusetts and Vermont state police at the

time Beaulieu was trying to flee the country.

Massachusetts authorities and the Plymouth County district attorney's office have not said whether he is charged with murdering the mother of four, and did not confirm he had been found until releasing a press statement Wednesday, nearly two weeks after the incident.

The family of the victim told

Brockton man convicted in Maine murders

After lengthy deliberations, jury finds city man guilty in 3 deaths, accomplice guilty of only 1

Two men were convicted Wednesday in a drug-connected triple slaying in which the victims' bodies were left to burn in a car.

Randall Daluz, 36, of Brockton, Mass., was convicted of three counts of murder and one count of starting a fire in the trial in Bangor, Maine.

Nicholas Sexton, 33, of Warwick, R.I., was convicted of one murder count and ar-

son, but the jury deadlocked on two other murder charges against him.

The bodies were discovered burned beyond recognition in a car in a Bangor parking lot in 2012. The victims were 24-year-old Nicolle Lugdon, of Eddington; 26-year-old Daniel Borders, of Hermon; and 28-year-old Lucas Tuscano, of Bradford.

Authorities said Sexton and Daluz came to the Bangor area in Sexton's rental car to sell drugs. Investigators concluded that Sexton was angry at Borders for al-

legedly switching to another source for drugs.

Sentencing has not yet been scheduled, but both men face maximum sentences of life in prison. Sexton sat with his head in his hands as the verdicts were read. Judge William Anderson warned Daluz to be quiet after a brief outburst.

The jury spent five days deliberating after hearing more than two weeks of testimony. The length of the trial took a toll on family and friends of the victims, said Barbara Ford, a friend of Lugdon's.

"The deliberations were long. We were all wondering what was going on. It was very stressful," she said. "Justice was

Illness didn't hold back teen

Town Spa worker who died of heart condition had 'wonderful soul'

STOUGHTON — Everyone who knew Marissa Ramos knew she had a smile that could light up the room.

She loved princesses, Disney World, bright colors, her church and soccer.

Despite having a pacemaker for her heart, Ramos, 17, was a go-getter, said her friends and members from her church, Immaculate Conception in Stoughton.

On Tuesday morning, students at Stoughton High School were informed that Ramos, a junior, died on May 27.

"Marissa, a member of the Class of 2015, was a bright light in our community and her absence will be felt by many," wrote Administrative Principal Juliette Miller in a notification that was sent to parents.

According to her obituary, Marissa died unexpectedly at home on Tuesday. She was active in the Student Council and Stoughton Youth Soccer. Donations in Marissa's memory were being sent to Healing Little Hearts. Its mission is to fund research at Boston Children's Hospital that will aid in the treatment and cure of pediatric heart defects.

"She lived her life and didn't let anything hold her back," said her boss, Kerry Hughes, a manager at Town Spa Pizza in Stoughton.

Ramos worked there as a
