BROCKTON MAN WALKING ON STREET SHOT AT 11 TIMES

During a summer that has seen hundreds of gunshots fired throughout the city, the day before Election Day and the last day of summer proved no different as police responded to three reports of gunfire in about 12 hours Monday.

At 10:27 p.m. Monday, a 21-year-old Brockton man was shot at 11 times by a group of people with three guns, police said.

The man was walking near the intersection of Florence and Blaine streets.


GOV. BAKER SAYS NEW PROTOCOLS NEEDED TO PROTECT KIDS

Gov. Charlie Baker said Tuesday that the state must update the way it handles investigations into allegations of abuse or neglect of children if it hopes to avoid more cases like the death of 2-year-old Bella Bond, whose body was found on a Boston-area beach in June.

Baker told reporters that one of his top priorities is revamping the intake policy for the Department of Children and Families, which he said hasn't been updated in a decade.

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
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Down to two in mayor's race

Carpenter, MacMillan move on to Nov. election

BROCKTON — After weeks of campaigning, the fates of dozens of candidates were placed in voters' hands Tuesday as they went to the polls for the city's preliminary elections.

Among the headlines from Tuesday's results were victories for Mayor Bill Carpenter and former City Councilor Christopher MacMillan, who will now square off in November's mayoral election. The two men defeated fellow candidates Jacob Tagger and Chris Hopgood.

In the city councilor-at-large race, incumbents Robert Sullivan, Moises Rodrigues and Shaynah Barnes all secured spots on

November's ballot, tallying the three highest vote totals in the race. The other five candidates who will appear with them on November's ballot consist of a mix of familiar and fresh faces that should make for a competitive election.

In the Ward 3 and Ward 4 School Committee races Mark D'Agostino got one step closer to avenging his defeat in 2013 and Brett Gormley found success as a first-time candidate.

In the Ward 6 City Council race, Jack Lally, an 18-year-old candidate, stole the show and is now poised to face veteran politician Steven Foote in November.

Teens charged in car breaks

Stoughton police say Brockton juveniles stole from several cars

STOUGHTON — Clare Coombs woke up Tuesday morning to a police dog sniffing the ground around her car.

"The police officer walked around the car, the dog walked across the front lawn, then they looked at the car next door in the driveway," Coombs said.

Police were investigating a rash of car breaks early Tuesday in the area of Willow, Turnpike and Page streets.

At least a half-dozen vehicles were broken into with electronics, money and other personal items being taken from the vehicles, said Stoughton police Detective Sgt. Robert Welch.

A couple hours after the first report, police detained three juveniles from Brockton — a 16-year-old and two 17-year-olds — who police say were arrested in connection with the crimes.

"Instead of getting ready to go to school, they're out stealing stuff from peoples' cars," said Coombs, whose car was not broken into. "I

Brockton woman invited to meet pope

Mary Waldron will be guest of Secretary of State John Kerry during Francis' White House visit

BROCKTON — When Mary Waldron received a call last month from Secretary of State John Kerry's office inviting her to the pope's White House visit, she asked if the invite was actually meant for Madeleine Albright.

Albright, a former secretary of state, has a similar name, she said.

But Kerry's invite was, in fact, meant for Waldron, a well-known political and academic figure in Brockton who will attend this morning's White House welcoming reception for Pope Francis.
