Charismatic and stylish first lady – and influential, tireless defender of her president husband – dies at age 94.

Nancy Reagan, the influential wife of the 40th president of the United States who unabashedly put Ronald Reagan at the center of her life but who became a political figure in her own right, died Sunday at her home in Los Angeles. She was 94.

The cause was congestive heart failure, according to a statement from Joanne Drake, a spokeswoman for Reagan.

Former first lady was no stranger to region

Nancy Reagan made several trips to the Inland Empire over the years, and the story of her first appearance with her husband, Ronald Reagan, is still recounted to visitors to the iconic Mission
